State End-of-Course assessments will begin on April 9 and run through May 15. AP testing will take place between May 7- May 18. College Credit Plus

Administration and counselors met with a packed PAC full of students/parents to discuss possible pathways to prepare and be ready for college. A popular pathway for many students is the College Credit Plus pathway. This is for grades 7-12, to enroll in an Ohio public college to earn high school and college credit. Some courses may be available within the walls of WHS (Composition I, Composition II, US History, Biology, College Algebra, and Pre-Calculus) and others would be earned on college campuses. See your counselor for more information. College Credit Plus intent forms must be turned in by March 23rd for next year's classes. Those students taking classes at WHS for college/high school credit will need to take the ACT, apply to University of Akron-Wayne Campus & meet the necessary requirements. An orientation meeting will be held at Wayne College on May 22 for students enrolling in fall CCP courses. For those enrolling in spring CCP courses, orientation will be on December 14. See your counselor for more information or questions.

Upcoming ACT Opportunities

<u>March 20. 2018</u>- All Juniors will take the ACT during the school day. This is FREE & a new state requirement, whether the student plans to attend a post-secondary institution or prepare for employment. WCSCC will return to WHS for the day to participate in this test. There will be a separate testing date for those with accommodations. The additional Writing portion will not be included.

April 3. 2018- This is an in-house test offered during the school day as well. Those interested in this ACT will bring check/cash/money order (\$46.00) to guidance in order to sign up. Registration will take place from 2/26 -3/20. There will be no accommodations and it will not include the additional Writing portion. Those students that intend to participate in College Credit Plus (CCP) for next school year should consider this date or the National test date. Only those that have taken the ACT will participate in the college orientation visit.

April 14, 2018- This is the National Test date. Those that choose to participate in the Saturday test will register and pay online (\$46.00) at www.ACTstudent.org. Student may choose the additional Writing Option for this test.

Scholarship Information

Scholarships are coming in daily. The only way to receive a scholarship is to apply. Go through the scholarship booklet received in the mail and circle scholarships of interest. We update & post WHS scholarships in the Naviance system and at www.waynecountycommunityfoundation.org.


Tips for writing that scholarship essay/application

- 1. Apply only if eligible, read carefully and follow instructions.
- 2. Be aware of all deadlines, try to submit at least five days prior to due date.
- 3. Submit a clean and neat application, preferably typed.
- 4. Submit a well-composed essay that makes an impression. Discuss your history and why those experiences have led you to apply for this scholarship.
- 5. Be honest. Stay positive.
- 6. Utilize the skills learned in English classes: organize, outline, stay on topic, use clear, concise language, edit, revise, proofread, proofread again, etc.
- 7. Attach additional sheet highlighting activities, awards, work experience, etc.
- 8. Seek assistance, if needed.
- 9. Give counselors/faculty/staff at least five days to compose a letter of recommendation, if needed.
- 10. Return application to counselor if required or mail application to the proper address with the required postage.

**Mark your calendar: Senior Scholarship/Academic Award Ceremony is Thursday, May 31, 2018 at 7:00pm. All seniors and their parents are encouraged to attend. This will award ceremony will honor both scholarship and academics for seniors only. No formal invitations will be sent.

Graduating Seniors:

A questionnaire will be available, beginning April 3 for you to complete. Fill it out on your mobile device or pick up a copy in the guidance office. This questionnaire is **extremely important** for many reasons, so please fill it out promptly with as much information as possible. It lets us know what you are doing for next fall: going to college, working, traveling, etc. It tells us the scholarships you have earned. It will serve as a release for your final transcript to the college/university you are planning to attend. Lastly, the information reported in this questionnaire will also be used for the commencement program. Questionnaires must be completed by **May 4** for graduation purposes and program preparation.

Upward Bound

Is your child thinking about going to college? Upward Bound is a program that helps eligible students get ready for college. The program provides academic advising, tutoring, college visits, test-preparation, and a 6-week summer program on a college campus. The program is funded by the U.S. Department of Education; therefore, there is no cost to students.

Upward Bound is recruiting now. Students in grades 9 or 10 who are interested in college are encouraged to apply.

Physical Education Waiver

Any student that has participated in interscholastic athletics, marching band or cheerleading for at least two (2) seasons will be exempted from participation in physical education, if so desired. Students MUST complete the entire season(s) in which they have elected to participate. Thus, a student who plays a combination of Wooster High School sports at any level—freshman, JV, or varsity or marching band or cheerleading for a total of two (2) seasons is exempt. In the case of an exemption, the student would be excused from physical education classes, but his/her total number of credits for graduation would not change, therefore, they would have to replace physical education with other academic electives or simply take physical education as an elective. The exemption would be noted on the student's transcript. In order to facilitate accurate scheduling and record keeping, we require each student to fill out an exemption form. Once both seasons are successfully completed, the student will obtain the verification signature form the Athletic Director and/or Band Director. At that time, the form will be reviewed with the appropriate guidance counselor and the waiver will be reflected on the student's transcripts. The flu season is upon us. Getting the flu vaccine is the best way to prevent getting the flu. Frequent HANDWASHING, especially before eating, is also a great preventative measure. If your child exhibits the symptoms of the flu, please keep him/her home to prevent exposure to other students. They can return to school after being fever-free (without the use of medicine) for 24 hours.

Eating a healthy breakfast, drinking plenty of fluids, getting enough sleep at night (limiting screen time), and getting at least 60 minutes of activity a day can help your child's immune system be at its best.
