School day

Our school day starts at 8:45 a.m. and ends at 3:30 p.m. Students will enter the building at 8:45 a.m. each morning. Students should not arrive on school grounds before 8:45 a.m. There is no adult supervision before 8:45 a.m. Students who arrive after 9:05 a.m. will be considered tardy, and students who arrive after 10:30 a.m. will be considered absent for the morning. If your child will be late or absent, please be sure to call the school (330-345-6434) by 10:00 a.m. on the day of the absence. Our office hours are 8:00 a.m.-4:30 p.m. However, our voicemail is available for messages if you call outside of office hours.

Remember...

There are two ways to pick up your children:

- 1) The curb-to-car pick up lane. Parents should remain in their cars and pull to an assigned cone. Your child will come to you.
- 2) Boys and Girls club pickup after 3:50

In order to make our school's dismissal safe and efficient for all, please follow these guidelines:

- Notify your child's teacher (in writing) if there is a change in his/her dismissal routine. If we have received no notification, then your child will follow his/her normal routine.
- All students start being dismissed from the building at 3:30 p.m.
- All cars should enter and exit from the west entrance.
- Wait for students in the <u>curb to car lane only</u> for pick up. Please do not stand in the transfer zone near the cones. This is the safe student zone for curb to car pick up only.
- Please <u>never</u> walk through the line of traffic. This models a dangerous behavior for all of our students.

Dear Melrose Families,

On January 8, 2002, the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001 (NCLB) was signed into law. Section 1111 (h)(6)(A) states that as a parent of a student at Melrose Elementary, receiving Title 1 Funds, you have the right to know the professional qualifications of the classroom teachers instructing your child. Federal law requires the school division to provide you this information in a timely manner upon request. Specifically, you have the right to request the following information about each of your child's classroom teachers:

- Whether the teacher meets the state qualifications and licensing criteria for the grades and subject he or she teaches.
 - All of our Melrose teachers are highly qualified in the areas for which they are the teacher of record.
- Whether the teacher is teaching under emergency or provisional status because of special circumstances.
 - We have no homeroom teachers in this category.
- The Teacher's college major, whether the teacher has any advanced degrees, and the field of discipline of the certification or degree
 - We have appropriately certified teachers who have earned their college degrees from various colleges and universities. Our reading teachers are specialists in their field.
- · Whether paraprofessionals provide services to your child and if so, their qualifications.
 - We have several instructional paraprofessionals who support our children under direct planning of the classroom teachers. They are all highly qualified for their positions.

School-Wide Title 1 at Melrose

What is Title 1?

Title 1 is a program that's federally funded in order to provide extra assistance to meet the academic needs of students in reading and math. The funding is determined by a formula including the number of students receiving free and/or reduced lunch. In Wooster City Schools, Melrose is one of four elementary schools receiving Title 1 funding.

What do these funds provide?

At Melrose, these funds provide one full-time reading teacher, Mrs. Runkle and multiple literacy and math coaches. Funds are also provided for some professional development for the teachers, some academic materials and to fund parent involvement activities.

What does Title 1 support look like at Melrose?

Since Melrose is considered a "school-wide" Title 1 school, Title 1 teachers may provide extra support for any student; however, most of the teachers' instructional time is spent with small groups that include learners at-risk. These small groups (1-6 students) may work within or outside the classroom depending upon the need of the student(s). Title 1 teachers help to assess the progress of each student at Melrose and work closely with classroom teachers to plan and provide instruction to help all students achieve one year's growth, (or more for students who need catch up growth). **For any questions regarding our Title 1 program, please contact Mrs. Runkle or Mr. Wolf.**
