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
# **STATE CHAMPS!**

Wooster High School's Speech and Debate team took first place at the Ohio Speech and Debate State Finals on Saturday, March 7. The team finished first place in the Team Sweepstakes and Ben Snoddy and Gaelan Gatz were named state champions in Policy Debate, the same category Snoddy was named best speaker. Taylor Bennington was also named state champion in Congressional Debate. Alli Wigham finished sixth in Oratorical Interpretation.

"Coming off of this weekend, I still can't stop smiling," said Coach William Franck. "These young people have worked so hard and are incredibly talented. To win as many contests as they have and then be the best team in Ohio is something special."

# **Financial Update**

Governor Kasich recently introduced his state biennium budget proposal, which will allocate funds to various agencies throughout the state including the education community. As this proposal makes its way to the state legislature for consideration, there are two parts of this recommendation that directly impact the finances of the Wooster City School District.

First, the subject of continued phase out of Tangible Personal Property (TPP) reimbursement is once again on the table. In prior years, the district has seen what was an annual funding source of nearly \$8 million be reduced to \$5.3 million. The Governor's budget proposal calls for further reduction of TPP reimbursement resulting in new and additional losses of \$743,000 to Wooster City Schools in each year of the budget. Conversation once again is centered on the eventual and complete elimination of this funding source to occur over the next several years. This situation by itself is problematic for the district.

The second part concerns core state funding to Wooster City Schools. This is commonly referred to as per pupil or formula basic aid. Estimates of how current student and community demographics impact the funding formula would cause an increase in per pupil funding of approximately \$850,000 the first year and \$940,000 the second year of the proposed budget.

Overall, as the draft budget stands, the proposed loss of TPP reimbursement when coupled with the proposed increase in per-pupil funding would allow the district to break even and possibly see a slight revenue gain in each of the next two years. However, when looking forward to future state budgets, will the per-pupil funding formula have the ability



# **Two-Tier Busing To Begin in August**

After careful deliberation, Wooster City Schools has determined it will implement a two-tiered busing system in August. Three goals led to this change as the school system desired to create a:

- Later school start time for their adolescent and young adult learners;
- 2. An earlier dismissal time for their elementary school children; and
- 3. Reduction of current walk zones, specifically the twomile walk zone for high school students.

Moving to a two-tiered transportation system enables the



American Academy of Pediatrics released a policy statement saying that middle and high schools should begin class around 8:30 a.m. Though we have not met this recommendation perfectly, we are much closer."

The new tentative schedule will

place the high school and Edgewood Middle School's seventh grade on roughly the same start and end times of 8:00 a.m. Grades K-6 will begin school around 9:00 a.m. Specific times and schedules will be released in early August.

"We are really pleased to announce that this change has also reduced our high school walk zone from two miles down to one mile while kindergarten – sixth grade student walk zones will be reduced from one mile to .75 miles", said Dr. Tefs.
