Music Educator

Edith Frey was a music teacher and choir director in the Wooster City Schools from 1963 to 1987. She was the musical director of the senior musicals. She organized the Christmas Sing every year, was a soloist at concerts of major classical works, and organized group choir festivals as well as State Contest.

Greg Patterson recalls, "She was the ultimate fine arts educator. She was talented, set her standards very high, and we aspired to please her. We performed high quality because she expected it from us. There were no discipline prob-



lems — we wouldn't dare. One icy stare was enough. But more importantly, we didn't want to disappoint her. She was firm, but gentle and generous. Mrs. Frey encouraged anyone no matter the talent level to keep singing, and there was no one who was not encouraged by her. She lead by example. Her soprano voice was superb, and could have had a singing career of her own. Instead she chose to teach young people. She was the best, and we were lucky to have her."

Frey attended Mount Union College and received a Master of Science degree from Kansas State Teachers College in 1963. "Music was my gift and calling, says Frey. "I was a Salvation Army kid of seven and sacred music was always a focus of family life and service to others."

She served as the Choir Director for the Wooster First Presbyterian Church. She was a soprano soloist and church soloist for many years.

In July of 1987, she was honored with a 23 and half Years of Service Award, presented by Wooster City Board of Education. She looks back fondly on her time at Wooster High School. She remembers, "I enjoyed the picturesque campus setting, which we now know as Cornerstone Elementarty. But most of all, the daily enthusiasm of the students."

"I am pleased to be recognized for many years of dedicated service by the WHS community," says Frey.
